Networking

Start With Who You Know:

- Teachers, counselors, and coaches can connect you with programs or alumni
- Parents, relatives, and family friends often know people in different fields, so don't be afraid to ask
- Club advisors often have specific major-focused networks you may be able to look into

• Use LinkedIn:

- Create a student LinkedIn profile: add your school, clubs, volunteer work, and interests
- Connect With:
 - Classmates
 - Club officers and teammates
 - Alumni from your high school
 - Professionals you meet at events

• Reach Out (Cold Emailing):

 When you find someone inspiring or someone you possibly would like to work with, send a short, polite email

- Step 1: Introduce yourself
 - Example: "Hi, I'm a junior at XX High School interested in medicine!"
- Step 2: Compliment or acknowledge their work
 - Example: "I saw your research project at Northwestern University about the XXX topic and found it extremely inspiring."
- Step 3: Ask for advice
 - Example: "I would love to hear about how you got started and what advice you would give to a high school student like me!"
- Step 4: Ask if they offer high-school opportunities
 - Example: "Your work really motivated me to take on a similar role, and I was wondering if there was any way I could shadow you to learn more about your research."
- Don't let yourself down if they don't respond. Keep going until you get a response!!

Attend Events:

- Community Events, Local Chambers of Commerce, or City Council Meetings
- Webinars, Guest Speaker Series, or Online Workshops
